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
# **PROJECT OVERVIEW**

The MassHire Greater Brockton Workforce Board (MHGBWB) engaged UMDI to provide a high-level assessment of the construction and construction-related trades including:

- Industry and occupation analysis
- Demographic makeup of the workforce
- Employment trends
- Role of unions in construction and related trades
- Current barriers to individuals seeking work in the trades and union occupations

#### To do this work, UMDI:

- Conducted data analysis on available workforce data
- Conducted five key informant interviews and a focus group of people with knowledge of training and hiring in construction-related occupations/trades
- Summarized findings in report for MHGBWB



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# **CURRENT CONDITIONS**



Construction is the fourth largest industry in Greater Brockton, based on the number of jobs.



Construction and construction-related jobs are subject to **high turnover**, likely due to the **temporary nature of most construction projects** as well as the **weather-dependent** and **physically demanding** nature of many of the relevant jobs.





There is **high demand** for workers with skills in construction-related trades. The **skills for each trade** are **highly specialized** and employers seek **experienced and licensed workers with training** as well as the transferrable or '**soft' skills** related to everyday job expectations.

#### BARRIERS TO CAREERS IN THE TRADES IN GREATER BROCKTON

From the interviews and focus group discussion, the following barriers were discovered:



**Advertising, Marketing, and Awareness:** There is a lack of awareness and knowledge of construction-related trades occupations among the general population and among high school students. Jobs are not always listed.



**Transportation:** Many construction or trades workers, or people who might go into these careers, have trouble accessing transportation, including access to cars and public transportation.



**Educational Barriers:** There is not enough training capacity to meet the needs of the region.




**Language Barriers:** Non-English speakers may have more issues knowing about trades careers, knowing where to find jobs, getting a job or getting promoted.



**Job Expectations and Soft Skills:** People who do get into construction trades work can find it to be more difficult or different than they thought. Employers are seeking trained and experienced, responsive workers.



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
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## **CONSTRUCTION: 7TH LARGEST OCCUPATION GROUP**






Construction-related Trades Occupation Group by Gender in Plymouth County 2022

Age 22-24





The occupation group has a higher share of Hispanic/Latino workers than the general population in Plymouth County.










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### **OCCUPATIONAL TURNOVER RATES**



## UNION APPRENTICESHIPS



There are **3 trade unions in the Greater Brockton region**: Boilermakers Local 29 in Avon, Roofers & Waterproofers Union Local (RUL) 33 in Stoughton, and Laborers International Union of North America (LIUNA) Local 721 in East Bridgewater.



2 of these local trade unions have apprenticeship programs: RUL 33 and LIUNA 721

There are an **additional 12 trade unions** near Greater Brockton, but technically outside of the 10-municipality region. In these unions, there are **11 apprenticeship programs** shown online.



Apprenticeship programs have a set number of seats and typically are only open to applicants once a year.

Apprenticeship programs can be between 2 and 5 years (the higher-skilled trades are usually 5-year programs)

## SUMMARY OF TRADE UNION ORGANIZATIONS

When discussing local trade unions in interviews and the focus group, these were the key highlights:



Union organizations provide benefits for trades occupations such as health insurance and retirement benefits including pensions.



Unions provide training opportunities and union workers are known for being highly-skilled.



Unions have a good reputation for high quality work and reliable workers.



There can be job security in being part of a trade union, but there is also less flexibility in moving around jobs.



Union labor can be **more expensive** than open shop contractors, causing some projects to choose open shop contractors especially in times of economic downturns or recession. There can also be tension between open shop contractors and union organizations.

## **SUMMARY OF KEY TAKEAWAYS**



Lack of awareness of the nature and quality of construction and trades work, as well as job openings not being very visible and requiring networking and word of mouth across the many small businesses, mean that knowledge of job opportunities and career possibilities is scarce.



The demographics of those currently in these occupations skews **more male and white**. At the same time, **pending retirements of older skilled workers** and high replacement rates mean the **demand for workers in these jobs** will only **increase over time**, creating opportunities to diversify.



More training programs and more exposure to information about construction jobs and related trades careers is needed for a larger share of the population. While there are union training programs available (apprenticeships) they require applications a year in advance and with the demand for workers as high as it is, even if every union apprenticeship slot were filled every year, they would not produce enough trained and skilled workers to meet the demand.
